I wandered lonely as a cloud By William Wordsworth

I wandered lonely as a cloud
That floats on high o'er vales and hills,
When all at once I saw a crowd,
A host, of golden daffodils;
Beside the lake, beneath the trees,
Fluttering and dancing in the breeze.

Continuous as the stars that shine
And twinkle on the Milky Way,
They stretched in never-ending line
Along the margin of a bay:
Ten thousand saw I at a glance,
Tossing their heads in sprightly dance.

The waves beside them danced; but they

Out-did the sparkling waves in glee: A poet could not but be gay, In such a jocund company: I gazed and gazed—but little thought What wealth the show to me had brought;

For oft, when on my couch I lie In vacant or in pensive mood, They flash upon that inward eye Which is the bliss of solitude; And then my heart with pleasure fills, And dances with the daffodils. Did you know that William Wordsworth was born in April 1770 in the Lakes
District in England? He went to the same school as Fletcher Christian who would lead the Mutiny on the Bounty in 1789?

William loved the natural world and was a keen walker among the Lakes District where he continued to live for most of his life? It was once estimated that he walked over 10,000 miles in his lifetime. He wrote extensively about the magnificent and the natural beauty of the Lakes District. People from London, which was a dirty congested city at the time, then flocked to the country.

His famous poem "The Daffodils" had no title and hence took the first line from the manuscript "I wandered lonely as a cloud" The poem had been scripted in 1802 after William and his sister Dorothy had encountered a long belt of daffodils on their afternoon walk.

Dorothy penned a journal and it is believed William's poem was influenced by Dorothy's journal notes - 'we saw a few daffodils close to the water side, we fancied that the lake had floated the seed ashore & that the little colony had so sprung up - But as we went along there were more & yet more & at last under the boughs of the trees, we saw that there was a long belt of them along the shore, about the breadth of a country turnpike road. I never saw daffodils so beautiful they grew among the mossy stones about & about them, some rested their heads upon these stones as on a pillow for weariness & the rest tossed and reeled and danced & seemed as if they verily laughed with the wind that blew upon them over the Lake, they looked so gay ever dancing ever changing.'





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Facts about August

- There's only four weeks of winter left (three now), spring is just around the corner.
- There are only 140 days until Christmas.
- The full moon in August is on Saturday the 9th and and is known as the Sturgeon Moon, named by North American Fishing Tribes for the abundance of Sturgeon fish in the Great Lakes during this time.
- August is known as a great time for stargazing, especially during the Perseid Meteor
 Shower that peaks between the 11th and 13th of the month.
- The first edition of the New Idea magazine was published in August of 1902.
- Gold was discovered in Ballarat in August, 1851 leading to Victoria's gold rush.
- In August, 1944 545 Japanese prisoners of war attempt to escape from a camp in Cowra, NSW and over 200 of these men died.
- The battle of Long Tan in Vietnam was Fought on August 18, 1966. It was a significant battle for Australian forces with 18 Australian soldiers losing their lives.
- The month of August has three birthstones, the Peridot, Spinel and Sardonyx and two birth flowers, gladiolus and the poppy.
- The coldest August day in Australia was recorded in 1914 at -23 at Charlotte Pass in NSW while the coldest day ever recorded in Mansfield is -4.3C on July 23rd, 1994.
 The hottest August day ever recorded in Australia was 41.6C at Yampi Sound in northwest Western Australia and the hottest ever recorded day in Mansfield was 455C on February 7th, 2009.
- In August, 1963, Martin Luther King Jr. delivered his iconic "I Have a Dream" speech during the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom.
- On August 14, 1945 Japan surrendered, marking the end of World War II.

THANKS TO IGA



Spring is fast approaching and it didn't take long for two of our residents, Rosemary and Betty long to enjoy the first rays of sunshine.





Back in the Day – Mansfield's Quirky Characters & Forgotten Traditions

Life in Mansfield used to have its own gentle rhythm, full of colourful characters and everyday rituals that still bring a smile to those who remember them.

Take *Vegemite*, for example—not the spread, but the stubborn horse who delivered our milk. Until 1973, you'd hear his steady clip-clop down the street each morning, milk cart in tow. Trouble was, Vegemite wasn't exactly a morning person. Most days, his owner, Wally, had to chase him around the paddock trying to catch the big draught horse before the deliveries could even begin. Eventually Wally threw his arms in the air, retired Vegemite to a paddock far away and replaced the old horse with Mansfield's first milk truck. Faster, yes—but far less entertaining.

Then there was the daily bread delivery. Each morning, Betty would deliver a loaf to your doorstep, still warm from the oven. The smell alone could pull you out of bed quicker than any alarm clock. No queues, no shopping lists—just simple, delicious certainty.

Not all daily rounds were as fragrant, of course. Roy, Mansfield's *dunny can man*, had one of the less glamorous jobs in town, but he did it with a smile. Well... most days. One infamous morning, Roy rounded the bend at the bottom of Tolmie Road in his rusty truck a bit too quickly, and the cans—contents and all—splashed out all over the truck before landing spectacularly across the road. It was the sort of incident you never forget, no matter how much you might want to.

And then there was *Bill (Gloworm by nickname)* He was the torch-bearing usher at Mansfield's beloved Star Cinema. When everyone was seated and the lights went down—he transformed into the enforcer of cinema silence. Whisper during the film and you'd feel the *wack* of *Bill's* torch on your head. Local teenagers, never ones to resist a challenge, would amuse themselves by rolling Maltesers down the aisles just to watch *Bill's* head swivel like a hawk on the hunt.

These were the people and moments that gave Mansfield its charm. A little mischief, a lot of community, and a cast of characters you couldn't make up.

These people and places weren't just part of the scenery—they were Mansfield. A little mischief, a lot of heart, and stories worth telling again and again.

Tips to Look after your Husband

Have dinner ready
